
Through our four key programs – education and culture change, community capacity building, systems change and building critical networks – we continue to provide innovative thought leadership and practical guidance and support for change makers.

AELA's Mission

To increase the understanding and practical implementation of Earth-centred governance in Australia.

Our Vision

Thriving ecocentric societies, living within their ecological limits and nurturing the living world.

Our Role

We are a unique thinktank and capacity building organization, providing creative leadership and support to others, to build Earth-centred governance.

AELA's History and Theory of Change

AELA was created in 2012, by a group of environmental lawyers who were inspired by the theory of Earth jurisprudence. Today, AELA is a multi-disciplinary network working to address the root causes of the ecological crises and continues to be inspired by Earth jurisprudence and the Earth-centred governance of Indigenous Peoples in Australia and around the world.

Earth jurisprudence suggests that we need to recognise that humans are only one part of nature ('one member of the Earth community'), that we are interdependent with the living world, and we need to govern ourselves and our societies, so that we nurture rather than destroy the living world.

THE PROBLEMS AELA IS WORKING TO ADDRESS

Earth jurisprudence From an perspective, industrialised societies have created the current ecological crisis - a climate changing world, with declining biodiversity and ecological health - due to our human-centred, extractivist world view and actions. These attitudes and actions have led to the creation of systems of governance (including law, economics, education and politics) that see humans as separate from nature, and that treat nature as just human property for endless use and consumption.

THE NEED FOR NEW GOVERNANCE SYSTEMS

The need for new governance systems has never been greater. To care for our shared home, we need to transition from human-centred to Earth-centred systems of governance, so we can nurture the living world upon which we depend. Despite the indisputable scientific evidence about climate change and environmental decline-and more than four decades of 'sustainable development' efforts - Australia's governance systems have not adapted sufficiently (or at all) to address the root causes of the ecological problems we face, and therefore are unable to make the changes necessary to respond to the current ecological crises.

AELA'S STRATEGIES AND ACTIVITIES

AELA is committed to building long term systems change, so that human societies can shift from human-centred to Earth-centred governance. We focus on building systems change that will impact on our legal, economic, educational and democratic systems.

OUTCOMES

Our strategies and programs aim to work across and connect core governance issues in Australia in order to: increase education and awareness about how current governance systems work; create and demonstrate how Earth-centred alternatives can work; and build communities of people inspired by and able to implement Earth-centred governance.

What is governance?

AELA's work focuses on how we can shift from governance systems that are human-centred and support endless growth on a finite planet, to governance systems that are Earthcentred, regenerative and nurture all life.

There are many different definitions of 'governance'.

Within AELA, we use a simple definition: 'the rules we make to live, work and play together in human society'.

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AELA's Key Programs

AELA has 4 key programs to help us achieve our mission:

Community Capacity
Building

We provide community capacity building support to people, communities and organisations advocating for Indigenous First Laws, Rights of Nature and Earth-centred governance in their local area.

Critical Networks

AELA prioritises building partnerships and supporting social change networks, in order to work with other amazing people and groups, and strengthen the impact of everyone's work.

Education and culture change

We create Earth-centred cultural change by providing education opportunities - including courses, workshops, webinars, cross-cultural learning and creative programs.

Systems Change Projects

We build systems change by empowering people, groups, and organisations to understand and implement systems change in practice – including through our Greenprints framework.

AELA's Activities in 2023 - 2024

1. EDUCATION AND CULTURE CHANGE

1.1 Providing education and information about ecocentric governance

AELA continues to be Australia's leading organization providing education and raising awareness about the holistic, Earth-centred systems change needed to build a successful and just society into the future. Every year, AELA hosts dozens of events – online and in person – to bring Earth-centred ideas and practices to a variety of audiences.

AELA hosted and co-hosted more than 180 public and private events and meetings during the financial year. This included: public lectures, panel discussions, conferences, community workshops and other public gatherings, to provide information and education about ecocentric governance.

This also included AELA hosting nearly 50 private meetings throughout the year, to provide expert advice about Earth laws to community groups, researchers, political representatives and others.
















1.2 Hosting educational workshops with Indigenous Partners

AELA is committed to working in solidarity with First Nations partners, to share cross cultural information and education about Caring for Country, First Laws and Earthcentred governance. We are also committed to contributing to the decolonisation of Western knowledge systems, to support diversity and flourishing of knowledge systems in Australia.

To do this work, AELA works closely with our sister organisation, Future Dreaming Australia. Together, we host public workshops, private mentoring, organisational training and development and other activities for our AELA networks.

This year, AELA and Future Dreaming provided cross-cultural training, delivered in a series of tailor made workshops, for two organisations – Bushtekniq in Brisbane, and the Bushfire Survivors for Climate Change, a national organization

2. BUILDING COMMUNITY CAPACITY

AELA works with individuals, groups and community-based organisations to provide support for Earth- centred community capacity building in Australia. This work includes supporting people who wish to advocate for Indigenous First Laws, Rights of Nature, Legal Personhood for Nature, Local Ecological Custodianship, Community Eco-Governance (Greenprints) and other Earth-centred governance initiatives in their jurisdiction or local community.

2.1 Support community groups and organisations to take action

Much of AELA's community capacity building work is carried out within our "Earth Laws Centre" (AELC), which provides a focus for education, information sharing and mentoring around governance transformation.

The AELC provides educational opportunities and capacity building support to communities, researchers and others, to help them understand current law and governance, and take action to make systems change. We also provide private mentoring, community workshop facilitation support, cross-cultural communication advice and training and other support activities, to empower local community groups and organisations to carry out their own Earth laws advocacy and community building work.

AELA's National Convenor, Dr Michelle Maloney, participates in conferences,

In 2023-2024, our community capacity building work included:

- ♦ Continuing to work with Regen Songlines Australia (regenerative-songlines.net. au) and Future Dreaming (futuredreaming.org.au), to co-host Indigenous-led knowledge events and projects, aimed at educating Australians about Indigenous First Laws.
- Supporting the Hawkesbury-Nepean Water Keepers management group as they develop strategies for working with local First Nations Peoples, and to develop shared Earth Laws and Rights of Nature projects
- Supporting a community group in South East Queensland called 'Care4Esk', to enable them to carry out koala and wildlife monitoring and community education, and to engage with their Local Council about Earth-centred care;
- Supporting Councillor Debra Mar, to introduce Rights of Nature and Ecocentric governance innovations to the Mornington Peninsula Shire Council;
- Supporting people on the Clarence River and Macleay River in New South Wales, to begin conversations in their communities about Earth laws, Rights of Rivers and Indigenous First Laws.

3. SYSTEMS CHANGE PROJECTS

To support Earth-centred systems change in Australia, AELA focuses on two streams of work:

- showcasing alternatives to current 'business as usual' human-centred governance models;
- supporting communities and organisations who wish to use AELA's 'Greenprints framework' to explore pathways to Earth-centred governance in their own bioregion.

Through our education programs and public events, we enable people to learn about new governance models, how to create systems change and how to connect personal and professional aspirations and activities, to broader systems change work.

Through our Greenprints program, we have developed a comprehensive pathway for people to learn about – and begin implementing – significant systems change in their own communities.

LITHGOW TRANSFORMATION HUB IN 2023-2024

In late 2022, AELA was pleased to be engaged by the Lithgow Transformation Hub, to bring the Greenprints program to the Hub's "Regenerating Lithgow" project. Regenerating Lithgow was an important capacity building project, that assisted with the recovery from the impacts of the bushfires through education, skills building, mentoring and creative activities. The Regenerating Lithgow coordinating team worked with the Greenprints approach to show case how the community resilience projects -could be brought into the biophysical capacity of its bioregion. The Greenprints team created a website with 'stories' showing the biocultural features of the region, and this was used in community workshops to catalyse further conversations.

GREENPRINTS FOR THE GOLD COAST

AELA has continued discussions with groups and community leaders in the Gold Coast region, to map out how the Greenprints approach might be used by diverse groups in the region. Further work is being done to connect First Nations Peoples, environmental organisations, economic initiatives and more, and in 2024-2025 a small research and pilot project will be commenced.

Background to the Greenprints Program

'Greenprints' was created by AELA's National Convenor, Dr Michelle Maloney, to help civil society groups and interested government authorities understand, and take very practical steps towards creating, Earth-centred governance. Greenprints fills an important gap, because while we have 'blueprints' to document the design of building and engineering projects, we don't yet have effective 'greenprints' for helping us construct Earth-centred human societies and economies that can nurture the Earth community and live within our ecological limits.

Greenprints provides a practical, step-by-step approach to help people understand both the big picture and the small details, of how to create systems change, transform our societies, and thrive within our ecological limits. It is place-based, encouraging people to start with their bioregions or catchments, and it demystifies and connects the many existing concepts, models and methods that can be used to create sustainable and regenerative communities and organisations.

AELA coordinates the Australian working group: "Stop Ecocide Australia", and also supports the amazing volunteers who are working to bring the Stop Ecocide International campaign to communities, politicians and practitioners in Australia.



Treasurer's Report

Treasurer's Report Megan Vu AELA Treasurer

This past year has been a period of significant transition for the Australian Earth Laws Alliance. While our work and impact continues to grow, we may be facing a reduced operational budget in the coming financial year, due to a decline in grant funding, and we have been making plans accordingly.

We've seen growth in some important areas of income. Our membership income has increased from \$12,426 in the 2022-2023 FY to \$20,280 in the current FY, demonstrating continued confidence from our members in our work. We've also diversified our income streams and increased the number of paid professional development courses we offer. More than 150 people paid to participate in our courses, bringing financial and knowledge sharing benefits.

Other items to note: In the 2022-2023 financial year, we received (and have been auspicing since then) a large Federal Government grant for the 'Care for Esk' community group (\$110,000). This is why it appears that AELA's donation income has dropped from \$221,794 in the 2022-2023 FY, to \$102,920, this year. We have in fact been supporting expenditure of the Federal Grant for Care for Esk.

AELA continues to produce a remarkable output for its small budget, and continued efforts will be made to secure grant funding beyond the 2024-2025 financial year

- Auspicing and supporting /Regenerative Songlines Australia', an important Indigenous initiative supported by AELA and other non-indigenous allies.

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Objectives

AELA's short-term objective is to promote the understanding and practical implementation of Earth Jurisprudence (Earth centred law and governance) in Australia.

The long-term objective is to see reform of Australian governance systems - including law, economics/ education and ethical frameworks - which reflect an earth centred worldview.

Strategy for achieving objectives

AELA works as a 'think and do' organisation. We aim to achieve our objectives by conducting outreach, education and information activities (workshops/ public lectures, conferences, educational courses); conducting and sharing research (including the publication of books, edited collections, journal publications and electronic articles); and partnering with a wide range of other organisations and initiatives/ to build networks of people and organisations promoting and implementing Earth centred governance.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. General information and statement of compliance

The general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001, Australian Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. A statement of compliance with the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) cannot be made due to the company applying not-for-profit specific requirements contained in the Australian Accounting Standards.

The Australian Earth Laws Alliance is a Public Company limited by guarantee incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The address of its registered office and principal place of business is 57 Highlands Drive, Narangba, QLD 4504.

The financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2024 were approved and authorised for issue by the Board of Directors on 18 November 2024.

2. New, revised or amending accounting policies

AASB 1058 Income for Not-for-Profit Entities and AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers. AASB 1058 clarifies and simplifies income recognition, in conjunction with AASB 15. These standards shift the focus from a reciprocal/non-reciprocal basis to a basis of assessment that considers the enforceability of a contract and the specificity of performance obligations.

AASB 1058 applies when a NFP entity enters into transactions where the consideration to acquire an asset is significantly less than fair value of the asset principally to enable the entity to further its objectives; the excess of the asset recognised (at fair value) over any 'related amount' is recognised as income immediately.

Under AASB 15, an entity recognises revenue when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied. This occurs when 'control' of the goods or services underlying the particular performance obligation is transferred to the customer.

These new standards are not applicable for the reporting entity but are relevant for an annual reporting period beginning on or after 1 July 2019.

Accounting standards issued but not yet effective have not been adopted.

3. Summary of accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared using the measurement bases specified by Australian Accounting Standards for each type of asset, liability, income and expense. These measurement bases are more fully described below:

3.1 Revenue

Revenue includes conferences and workshops, fundraising activities, and member contributions. It is recognised when the amount can be measured reliably, collection is probable, the costs incurred or to be incurred can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured by reference to the fair value of consideration received or receivable.

4. Trade and other payables

This represents net amounts for the following Auspice Projects:

- (a) Care4Esk
- (b) CD Institute
- (c) Women's Climate Congress

The amount is presented as a current liability as payment is due within 12 months. They are recognised initially at their fair value.
